
Marist College Campus Climate Survey Key Findings: November 2022


- The HEDS Campus Climate Survey was open to all enrolled Marist students in November 2022. 657 students participated in the survey compared to 743 students in April of 2021.
- Overall, 80% of the students surveyed reported that staff, faculty, and administrators have concern for their well-being. Over 65% of students reported other students are concerned for their welfare.
- Sixty-eight percent of the students surveyed agreed or strongly agreed that they feel a part of the Marist community.
- Over 70% of students surveyed reported believing Marist would handle a crisis well and would take reports seriously.
- Fifty-three percent of students reported having a good support system on campus, while 57% agreed or strongly agreed a student would intervene if they needed help.
- Since starting at Marist, 82% received education on sexual assault, with 57% remembering that education.
- Of students who completed the survey, 12.5% reported being sexually assaulted in their lifetime; 19% of these sexual assaults reported, occurred in the residence halls or on campus.
- The most common reasons for students not reporting incidents of sexual assault and sexual misconduct were: "I didn't think others would think it was serious," and "I didn't want to get the people who did it in trouble."

Marist College Supplemental Questions:

• Close to 90% surveyed knew that the Title IX Office leads Marist's response to reports of sexual assault, dating & domestic violence, stalking, and other forms of gender-based misconduct.




• Seventy-two percent surveyed knew how to make a Title IX report.




• Only 43 % surveyed knew where the Title IX office was located.



 Over 90 % surveyed reported knowing that the College requires all parties to obtain affirmative consent prior to engaging in sexual activity.



• Seventy-eight percent surveyed have noticed the Title IX Office's presence on-campus. With over 73% satisfied with the programming and outreach.



In general, students who completed the Campus Climate Survey indicated a need for more information on how to help a friend who has been assaulted, more information on human trafficking, and more refreshers on Title IX past the first year at Marist College.
