About Marist College

Located on a beautiful 225-acre campus along the shores of the Hudson River in Poughkeepsie, New York, and at its Florence, Italy campus, Marist College is a comprehensive, independent institution grounded in the liberal arts. Founded in 1929 by the Marist Brothers, today Marist College is a nonsectarian institution whose mission is to “help students develop the intellect, character, and skills required for enlightened, ethical, and productive lives in the global community of the 21st century.”

Offering one of the most comprehensive and technologically advanced educational programs among any institution its size, Marist annually enrolls approximately 5,000 undergraduate and 1,400 adult and graduate students hailing from nearly every state and over 50 countries. Students choose from 53 bachelor’s programs and 14 graduate programs, including M.B.A., M.P.A., M.S., and M.A. degrees as well as Doctor of Physical Therapy and Physician Assistant programs. More than half of Marist students participate in the College’s nationally acclaimed study abroad program, and 83 percent complete at least one internship.

Marist’s faculty provide students with a forward-thinking, tech-savvy, and innovative curriculum that leverages high-impact learning practices such as research, community-based learning, and common intellectual experiences. The College has a 16:1 student ratio and six traditional academic schools: Communication and the Arts, Computer Science and Mathematics, Liberal Arts, Management, Science, and Social and Behavioral Sciences, as well as the School of Professional Programs.

Consistently recognized for excellence and value by The Princeton Review (*Colleges That Create Futures* and *Happiest Students*), *U.S. News & World Report* (Best Regional Universities/North, Most Innovative, Best Undergraduate Teaching, and Best Value rankings), and others, Marist is engaged in an array of unique partnerships and initiatives that set it apart from peer institutions. These include the nationally recognized Marist Poll, which partners with major media outlets and is the only college-based poll to be fully integrated into the academic enterprise; the 30-year-old IBM Joint Study Program, which has brought to the College world-class technology typically found at leading research institutions; the Hudson River Valley Institute; Center for Sports Communication; Raymond A. Rich Institute for Leadership Development; and several others.

Marist’s Division I Red Fox Athletics program competes in the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference and boasts 23 intercollegiate varsity sports teams and 18 club teams, with 2,500 students participating in intramurals.

With an annual regional economic impact of \$439 million and drawing more than 61,000 visitors to campus each year, Marist is an engine of opportunity for the region, which includes its investment in Longview Park, a riverfront, community hub that is home to the champion Marist men’s and women’s rowing teams. The College also hosts the digital archives of the Franklin D. Roosevelt Presidential Library in nearby Hyde Park, making it one of only six colleges and universities in the nation that are affiliated with a presidential library, as well as several other study sites.



DR. KEVIN C. WEINMAN

President

Kevin C. Weinman joined Marist College as its fifth president on Oct. 4, 2021. Weinman’s academic and professional careers combine scholarship in the history of urban planning and public policy with extensive financial and administrative leadership in the private and higher education sectors. A hands-on leader, he is deeply committed to the powerful blend of liberal arts education, pre-professional and professional training, and graduate research and scholarship that are the hallmarks of a Marist education.

He has prioritized access, equity, and inclusion throughout his career. In December 2021, Weinman and his wife Beth made a personal pledge of \$250,000 to support programs to make a Marist education more accessible and equitable for a diverse and talented group of students. Also during his first year as president, he led the recruitment of a diverse and dynamic cohort of 24 new faculty, the largest in the College’s history. In May 2022, Weinman initiated a new strategic planning process for the College to build upon Marist’s strong foundation while articulating a bold and ambitious vision for the future.

Weinman came to Marist after serving for over eight years as chief financial and administrative officer at Amherst College. There he set strategy and led operations for finance, investments, shared services, and information technology, as well as leading the operational elements of the college’s Covid-19 response. The transparent and inclusive financial planning and budgeting processes he instituted helped the college make significant progress in the enrollment of talented students from low-income backgrounds and achieve key priorities in student life and wellbeing; diversity, equity, and inclusion; academic support; new academic and residential facilities; and a comprehensive climate action plan.

Prior to joining Amherst, Weinman led various financial operations at Dartmouth College, first serving as director of financial planning and budget from 2007 to 2010 and then as assistant vice president of finance from 2010 to 2013.

Before deciding to pursue a career in higher education, Weinman held several finance and marketing roles at Hewlett-Packard, Agilent Technologies, Deluxe Corp., and Western Union. He began his career in public accounting, is a former certified public accountant, and has presented at national conferences on the topics of risk management, strategic planning, and financial modeling.

A first-generation college student, Weinman earned a Ph.D. in History from the University of New Hampshire, an M.A. in History from the University of Colorado—Colorado Springs, and an M.B.A. from the Kenan—Flagler Business School at the University of North Carolina—Chapel Hill. He received a B.B.A. from the University of Notre Dame, majoring in Accounting and History. Weinman has taught courses on modern American history and the rise of the suburbs to both college-aged and nontraditional students.

Weinman is a native New Yorker who grew up in northern New Jersey. His wife Beth grew up in Southern Pines, North Carolina, and earned both a B.S.B.A., majoring in Business, and a Master’s in Accounting from the Kenan-Flagler Business School at the University of North Carolina—Chapel Hill. They have two children, Alex, a college student at Colorado College, and Brooke, a high school senior.

Inaugural Speaker



DR. CAROLYN “BIDDY” MARTIN

Biddy Martin, a nationally respected and deeply experienced higher education leader, served as president of Amherst College from June 2011 to July 2022. She was the college’s first woman president, its 19th leader, and the college’s longest-serving president of the past 50 years. During her tenure, she oversaw the building of the state-of-the-art Science Center and multiple other transformational capital projects while promoting a dramatic leap in faculty hiring. Martin led efforts to attract the best and brightest students from widely diverse backgrounds, as evidenced in the Class of 2025, which for the first time in Amherst history self-identifies as majority domestic people of color. Among her many other accomplishments, she led the college’s highly successful \$625 million capital campaign and more than doubled the endowment to approximately \$3.7 billion.

Martin is a scholar and professor of German, sexuality, women’s, and gender studies at Amherst and is serving as President-in-Residence at the Harvard Graduate School of Education for the 2022–2023 academic year.

Prior to joining Amherst, Martin served as chancellor of the University of Wisconsin–Madison from 2008 to 2011 and as Cornell University’s longest-serving provost from 2000 to 2008. As chancellor at UW–Madison, Martin led successful initiatives to increase need-based financial aid, improve undergraduate education, and enhance research. Martin also spearheaded an effort to gain greater operating flexibility and increased autonomy for Wisconsin’s flagship campus.

A distinguished scholar of German studies and the author of numerous articles and two books—one on a literary and cultural figure in the Freud circle, Lou Andreas–Salomé, and a second on gender theory—Martin served on the faculty and in various leadership roles at Cornell University for more than two decades before being named provost in 2000.

Martin is an elected member of the American Academy of Arts & Sciences and holds honorary degrees from the College of William & Mary, Williams College, Amherst, the University of North Carolina–Chapel Hill, and Doshisha University. In 2018, she was elected to the Harvard Corporation, a governing board of Harvard University.

A graduate of the College of William & Mary, where she majored in English literature and was a member of Phi Beta Kappa, Martin earned an M.A. in German literature from Middlebury College’s program in Mainz, Germany, and a Ph.D. in German literature from the University of Wisconsin–Madison.

College Symbols



The Mace

The Marist College mace supports a three-sided crown emblazoned with the College seal. The crown symbolizes the College's three goals: excellence in education, a sense of community, and commitment to service.



The Seal

The Marist College seal features the location of the institution, Poughkeepsie, New York; the interlaced letters A and M; 1929, the date that college-level courses were first offered; and 12 stars. The letters and stars are symbols of Mary, reflecting the traditions of the College's founders. The center is crowned with the motto Orare et Laborare, to Pray and to Work.



The Medallion

The medallion is worn as part of the president's regalia. It includes the Marist College seal and reflects the authority of the office.



The Presidential Gown

The presidential gown was designed by faculty members from Marist's Fashion Design program. It has four sleeve bars instead of the usual three of a doctoral robe. The primary color of the gown is Marist red, framed by standard black panels adorned with an embroidered "M" from the College's seal and Main Gate. The hood also features Marist red and includes a white chevron. During the inauguration ceremony, the president will remove the robes associated with his earned degree and don the Marist College presidential gown.



History of the College

Founded as a college in 1929, Marist's roots go back to 1905, when the Marist Brothers, a Catholic teaching order, first purchased property on the eastern shore of the Hudson River for the establishment of a novitiate to train young Brothers for a life of teaching and religious duty.

The Order of the Marist Brothers was founded in France in 1817 as an effort to provide an educational and spiritual respite from the violent revolutions and counterrevolutions afflicting France at the time. The order is particularly oriented towards public service and the formation of young people, so it found a natural calling in higher education.

In 1929, the novitiate became a college when it was authorized by New York State to grant Bachelor of Arts degrees. Known as the Marist Normal Training School, it was a junior college that offered B.A. degrees through its affiliation with Fordham University. In 1946, the State of New York granted what was now known as Marian College an official, four-year charter under the leadership of founding president Bro. Paul Ambrose Fontaine, FMS. Its first class consisted of four Marist Brothers. An extensive expansion of the campus followed, with the Marist Brothers themselves doing much of the work constructing Our Lady Seat of Wisdom Chapel, Donnelly Hall, a new gym, residence halls, and other academic buildings.

In 1960, the institution changed its name to Marist College and expanded its mission. The College continued to fulfill its values of service, community, and educational excellence, admitting laypeople to pursue undergraduate studies and also adding an evening division to serve adults in the surrounding community. By 1969, women were admitted, and control, governance, and fiscal responsibility were transferred to a diverse lay board. While deeply proud of its heritage, Marist College is an independent, comprehensive institution of higher education and welcomes students of all faiths and backgrounds.
