



## International Experience for Adult Students

### GLOBAL PERSPECTIVE OF THE WORLD - ROME

This one week trip to Rome is offered with a credit (course and tour) or non credit option (tour only). It will provide students with the opportunity to explore the global business environment in Italy. Intended for the working adult student, the 3 credit course option will begin December 5th during the Fall II online term. The trip to Rome will take place Sunday, January 17th through Saturday, January 23rd. The class will then conclude at the end of the Fall II term in early February.

#### THE COURSE

#### GBST 103L741

#### Intro to Global Issues

#### Fall II 10 week online

This course is intended as an introduction to the geography, vocabulary, and perspectives needed to understand the evolution of our global community, the challenges that we face in the 21st century, and different approaches for managing those challenges. It takes a historical perspective, focusing on the effects of colonialism and the complex encounter it provoked between non-Western and Western societies. It also addresses an array of interrelated global issues that we face in the post-colonial period, including cultural and religious diversity, human rights, economic development, ecological sustainability, and the possibilities and challenges of international conflict and cooperation.

#### INSTRUCTOR

David Testa, Ph.D.

This experience will consist of pre-departure online readings and activities designed to engage students in the exploration of the Italian culture. Students will have the opportunity to experience Rome through its museums, ancient ruins, and historical and cultural site visits. All presentations will be in English.

#### HOUSING

Participants will stay in a three star hotel with an option for single or double occupancy. A continental breakfast is included each morning. There will be a welcome reception as well as a farewell dinner. All other meals will be the responsibility of the participants. We encourage you to explore the culinary offerings available in Rome.

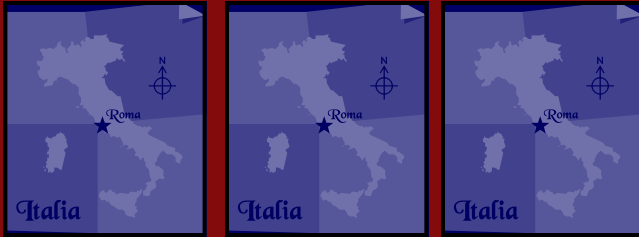
