

- 3. Discuss the role of Julian in the novel.
- 4. How is the 'March on Washington' used to mark the pivotal point of this novel?
- 5. Discuss the use of proverbs in the novel.
- 6. Discuss the ways in which your view of African has been affected by reading this novel.

7. Compare and contrast Angelou's presentation of Africa with Achebe's presentation.

- 8. Angelou discovers that "Despite the murders, rapes, and suicides, we had survived." Discuss the evidences she presents in the text to support this assertion.
- 9. Is this a reverse middle passage experience or a middle passage experience? Discuss.
- 10 Prejudice is a burden which confuses the past, threatens the future, and renders the present inaccessible. Discuss this comment in light of this novel by Angelou.
- 11. Roscoe tells Angelou to "Be careful, dear girl, that Africa doesn't take away all your cynicism. You have become dangerously young." Discuss this as a major theme in the text.
