 - 3. Road Trip 1866 –Isaac Newton OHK to Boston women
- D. December 4, 1867 official organization still a work in progress (11/15/1867)
 - 1. Hierarchical Structure bottom up.
 - 2. Missionary Journey 3/28/1868 One success story Fredonia NY, April 1868.
- II New York State History
 - 1. Granges organized between 1968 & 1873 26, all but two in 1873
 - 2. Call OHK to organize Nov 6, 1873 reps from 21 Granges met in Syracuse FM McDowell chosen Chairman, Robert Farley Jr., NYC, chosen as Sec.

3. First Annual Session 3/18-20/1874 – now 164 Granges reported Committee of women to further their interests

Resolution to lobby the Legislature to allow farmers to establish Fire Ins. Co's.

For Granges to be able to organize county unite – facilitate trade Lobby Gov. for more public markets in State – where needed. Opposed liquor traffic Supported Women's suffrage Called for Agricultural research

4. Second Generation of Leadership 1878

Cooperatives had been established one doing over \$200K in its first 10 month (with this came the establishment of County Grange organizations)

Mutual Fire Insurance Companies, with over \$5M in assets

Membership expanded to over 30k – 429 Granges

1881 – moved to extend suffrage to women, Geneva Experiment Station

Railroads still an issue. Called for establishment of State RR Commission 1887

State Dairy Commissioner

1890's Rural Free Delivery – Grange Building at State Far –Rural Roads

5. 20th Century

1901 Pan American Expo, Buffalo 36,000 visitors to the Grange rooms Movement for better roads

Strong competition from The Farmer's Alliance

1893 – Structure changed – enter Pomona Granges

Juvenile Grange added 1904

1906 – Protection of horses on public roads

1906 Cornell Trustee until the 1970's

1907 Diaryman's League

1914 - Farmers & Traders Life Insurance Co.

1920 - GLF

1920's – Rural school situation 1928 extensive survey

FDR – First Grange member as US President
