Communications between CLS Membership and the CLS Council

~ New Procedures ~

In order to simplify and facilitate communications between the membership, the Council and committee chairpersons, as well as to reduce the amount of emails that require handling by the CLS office, a new email procedure has been implemented. Using this procedure has two primary benefits for our members:

- 1- Members are not required to know the name of the individual in a particular position on the council, nor are they required to know the email for the individual.
- 2- An historical record of all communications between membership and the council will be kept on the email ID associated with each council position.

The procedure is as described here:

- 1- Address all emails to: clsmarist@gmail.com
- 2- In the **Subject line**, use one of the following **keywords** to indicate the general area of your communication. The keywords are NOT case sensitive.

A list of CLS council members & committee chairs responsibilities has been included to assist you.

At the end of the semester, I realized that she had *purfect* attendance!

For the finale of the course, I created a slideshow of personal photographs that were special to class members. I decided to put it to music using a recording of "Kodachrome" by Paul Simon. I had to replay the slideshow numerous times to get the lyrics synchronized with the photos. Whenever Gracie heard "Kodachrome" playing, she would appear in the den, jump up on the desk and sit in front of the monitor to watch the slideshow, over and over as I fine-tuned it. She never gets tired of it!

Not all of Gracie's classroom experiences were successful. On one occasion, while I was attending a Zoom class from another organization, Lucy leaped on the desk, landing on the keyboard, catching her back paw on a lamp cord. The lamp went down on top of her and as she fled, she skidded across the desk on a stack of papers into a cup of tea, fortunately not hot, which toppled over pouring tea across the desk, and everything on it. I reacted shouting, "GRACIE, NO!" and as I tried to stop the flow of tea, I saw, in horror, that my Zoom camera and microphone were on!

Gracie was not the only cat who played a role in CLS Zoom classes. Cathy Kinn's cat, Abby, decided to assist Cathy in her role as class manager. As Cathy tells it," My only kerfuffle happened during our third meeting when I left the site for just a minute to get my book and when I got back, ***everything*** was going awry. Members were being made co-hosts, people were being switched around...Robin was right there and getting readjusted took only a few minutes. Later, when we were trying to figure out what happened, I remembered that my cat had been in the area...and when Abby wants to go from Point A to Point B, keyboards don't matter at all." "My name is Alithia. I am a single mother with a son. My son is my first, and one of the biggest, joys of my life. I have raised my son as a single mother from an early age. I have not had the pleasure of having a lot of support, but with the support I have had, I knew that if I were to be lucky enough, I would definitely want to put those opportunities to good use

When I was younger, I was lucky enough to attend college at a community school. I attended school for about three years after being out of high school for many years. Unfortunately, I wasn't so fortunate to graduate because raising a child, going to college, and working to provide for my son and myself proved to be too much. 

My 100-Year Reflection by Eric Fuegel

Eric Fuegel, at 100 years of age, is currently the oldest member of Marist's Center for Lifetime Study, joining in 2001. He became an active and vocal member, sitting right in the front row of classes. He engages with presenters regularly, according to Ange Rapa and Leathern Mehaffey. Eric was a longtime member of the Classroom Support Committee.

But there is more to Eric Fuegel then just his membership in CLS.

Eric is a senior member of IEEE, a member of AAII, the Mystic/New Moon Lodge and the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts. He is also an avid racing sailor as part of the Chelsea Yacht Club. Eric took up ballroom dancing in 2005 with Ben and Esther and is a member of the Leisure Time Dancers, Ballroom and Latin Dance Club of the Hudson Valley, Mid-Hudson Valley Ballroom Dance Club, and Germania, and looks forward to dancing again alongside CLS's own Esther Odescalchi, his partner in this picture.

Eric worked at both General Electric and IBM continuously for approximately 50 years in product development and product engineering in many management and technical positions.

During the World War II years, Eric worked for GE in Schenectady, Lynn, and Pittsfield, Massachusetts in the capacitor lightning arrestor cutout division.

In 1950, Eric moved to Poughkeepsie for IBM in DSD working with EAM

punch card machines, the electrical lab, and 701 and 702 computers. He worked at World Headquarters, 590 Madison Avenue, NYC, where he had a one-year temporary assignment with McDowell, who reported to Tom Watson, on design automation, reliability, and the RAMAC computer, which was being developed and manufactured in San Jose. Eric worked in ASDD in Westchester where he learned software simulation of hardware. In Poughkeepsie, Eric worked in a group developing a software simulation model of MVS, he did the IOS part, then did an IOS subsystem simulation model in the hardware architecture group before his retirement in 1990. Eric also taught a Calculus class at Marist College.

Eric was involved in many organizations. He was chairman of the Western Massachusetts RPI Alumni Association, the Poughkeepsie Day School Board of Trustees, and chairman of the DC Chapter, NYS and National Society of Professional Engineers. At CYC, he was captain of the lightning, club, and ensign fleets. Eric was also active in the Boy Scouts of America, was an Eagle Scout and assistant scout master in Kingston, and later served as DC District Commissioner of the Nimham District.

Eric was born in Brooklyn, NY on November 30, 1920 to Gottlob John and Helena Matilda Muehleisen Fuegel. His parents were natives of Germany and immigrated to the United States before World War I. He lost his only sister when she was fifteen and his father when Eric was sixteen. Eric grew up in difficult financial circumstances. At age 10, Eric apprenticed as a tool maker at the Apollo Magneto Corporation under his uncle, Herman Schmidt. Eric attended Kingston High School, graduating in January, 1938. He was press and managing editor of *Dame Rumor*, the High School newspaper, and was a member of the NRA, DeMolay, and Sea Scouts. He won an Advanced Mathematics prize, and 1/3 of an American Legion prize.

Eric started RPI the following September where he was a member of Phi Kappa Tau fraternity and was Vice President and Scholarship Chairman. His degrees include a B.E.E. in 1942 and an M.E.E. in 1948. RPI honorary societies were LCR, Eta Kappa Nu, Tau Beta Pi, and a full member of Sigma Xi. He learned about solid state physics taking classes at Syracuse University. In 1979, he received his M.S. in Operations Research at Union College.

Currently, because of COVID-19, Eric is in quarantine like the rest of us and he is anxiously awaiting the reunion with his dancing, CYC, and CLS friends.
