Welcome to POSC 110, American National Government! I look forward to a rewarding summer session. For those whom I haven't met yet, allow me to introduce myself! I'm Dr. Jessica Boscarino, Associate Professor and Chair of Political Science. I teach classes in American politics, public policy, and the environment. Over these eight weeks, we'll be thinking deeply and critically about the American political system. This class balances understanding the history of politics and government in the U.S. with an attention to how it matters for today. As someone living and/or studying in the U.S., you are affected by American government everyday – you should know how it works! We'll be thinking about values (like democracy, liberty and equality) that formed the basis for our government, and whether we live up to them today; institutions (like Congress, the presidency and the courts); and actors (like the media, political parties and interest groups) that all affect our politics.

This class is organized week-by-week. A new week will begin on Sunday morning at 8 am and end the following Saturday at 11:59 pm. Each week is then divided into two parts. For each part, you will have material and tasks to complete. The first part of the week should be completed by Tuesday at 11:59 pm; the second part by Saturday at 11:59 pm. Typically, you will have reading to do (usually a chapter in our textbook, sometimes accompanied by a supplementary article), one or two "mini-lectures" to watch, and an assignment to be completed (e.g., an online quiz, discussion post, or other activity). In addition, you will have a short paper, video presentation, and a final exam. By the end of the course, you should feel confident developing and articulating your own opinions about American politics.
