Welcome to the winter inter-session offering of BUS302 - Organization Behavior!

This course is intended to introduce the primary concepts of individual and group behaviors in the workplace. In addition to acquiring an understanding of these concepts, I hope you will be challenged to develop your own interpersonal and communication skills.
