Welcome to HIST 274: Modern Latin America. This course examines Latin American history from 1800 to 2000, with a particular focus on the histories of capitalism, urbanization, and

political revolution across the region.

You can call me Prof. Pinto. I am an Assistant Professor of History at Marist, and a specialist

in the history of slavery and capitalism in Modern Brazil. I earned my PhD in History at Stony Brook University in 2018 and I taught at Boston College, Trinity College, and at St. Olaf

College before joining Marist in the fall of 2023.

This course runs for eight weeks. This class will be entirely asynchronous, although there will

be four recorded lectures that you will be asked to watch and complete a quiz in reference to.
