## **About the course:**

So, what on Earth does that mean? Well, this is neither a straight science course nor a comprehensive history course. In this class, we will examine how we use concepts in science and history to examine our world. We will always do so with an eye towards how science and history interact with our culture and society (both locally and globally), and our personal, individual lives.

## **About the course format**

This course is taught **fully online** through Marist's new course management system, Brightspace. Brightspace provides 24/7 access to the course materials (syllabus, readings, assignments, etc.), individual grades, and messages. As of 8/19/23 there are very few students enrolled in this course. It is not feasible to engage in typical peer-to-peer and instructor discussion threads. There are NO required discussion forums in this course. There are NO mandatory minimum days/hour per week for engaging in the course in Brightspace, but **students are expected to stay on track with the course outline, calendar, and assignment deadlines. Submitting assignments on time will determine attendance.** Students should expect 3 main categories of assignments including textbook chapter summaries and responses, prompt-based journal entries, and an argumentative research paper on a topic provided by the instructor.
