

When Vallane Sneva '27 arrives for morning lab, the DI student-athlete is often still in her volleyball warm-up jacket from practice. But within minutes, she's balancing chemical equations with the same persistence and focus she brings to the court. It's a rhythm she's mastered at Marist—moving between identities, responsibilities, and passions without ever feeling like she must choose only one.

"I'm not just a biomedical sciences major or an athlete," said Vallane. "Marist helped me see how every experience shapes who I am and what I can do."

Vallane's pursuits stretch far beyond the lab bench and the court. She's a tutor for local high-school students, and a communications coordinator for the Black Student-Athlete Association, and an Honors Program researcher exploring the intersection of psychology and religion, and an aspiring global traveler preparing for a short-term microbiology course in France.

She's living proof of why Marist University believes so deeply in the power of "and" not "or."

It's an enduring educational approach that combines Liberal Arts and pre-professional studies and immerses students in classroom instruction and experiential learning to prepare them to succeed in a complicated world. Students are challenged to blend the analytical with the human, the global with the local, the technical with the creative.

The Idea in Action

In a world transformed by globalization, emerging technologies, and constant change, Marist's approach gives students something algorithms can't match: a layered education that develops curiosity, judgment, and purpose.

"Marist's 'and' not 'or' philosophy leans into our mission and mindset, rooted in the founding values of the Marist Brothers, and combines intellect, character, and skills," said Marist University President Kevin Weinman. "It's critically important given the pace of change in today's society that we're not just preparing our students for a career or for material successes, but also developing them into enlightened, ethical, and productive leaders who will thrive as they work across relationships, borders, and cultures."

It's this human edge—rooted in nearly a century of liberal arts excellence and strengthened through experience—that prepares Red Foxes not just to adapt, but to lead.

In an economy defined by rapid change, employers are looking for graduates who can bring both expertise in a given profession and the human qualities that make expertise matter. They want thinkers who communicate clearly, collaborate across disciplines, navigate ambiguity, and lead with integrity—capacities that can't be automated or easily taught on the job. Marist's educational model is intentional about cultivating these strengths.



Behind every Marist story is a network of mentors—faculty, alumni, and peers—who invest in the growth of others. That guidance begins in the classroom and lasts far beyond graduation.

The strength and expanse of this network was on full display during the Center for Career Services' recent Road to the Workplace visit to Paramount in New York City (see more on p. 6), where Katie Altuz '12, Director of Multi-Platform Content Strategy for the MTV Entertainment Group was one of many Marist alumni at Paramount who welcomed students into her world—offering an inside look at breaking into entertainment and building a creative career.

Science & Discovery

In Marist's Gross Anatomy Lab, future healthcare leaders experience a form of learning that blends scientific rigor and human connection. Physician assistant, physical therapy, and athletic training students work directly with human donors, gaining an understanding of anatomy impossible to achieve through textbooks alone.

For many, it becomes the moment when classroom theory and professional purpose converge.

Under faculty guidance, students learn more than musculature and systems—they learn responsibility, respect, and empathy. The lab teaches them to see both the science and the story in the human body: pacemakers, surgical hardware, anatomical variations, signs of disease. It's a powerful reminder that medicine requires clinical skills and deep compassion.

The Human Edge

Back in the Dyson Center's Atrium, Bas Vallane finishes studying for her finals and grabs her volleyball gear before heading to the gym, she embodies what it means to be a Red Fox: multifaceted, driven, grounded, and lifted by a community that encourages her to explore in every direction. She's not choosing between passion and profession; she's energized by both.

"At Marist, you don't have to choose who you'll be, you get to become all of it," she said. And as she considers the path ahead, graduation, med school, and more, she adds, "I used to assume I'd have to give something up—research, athletics, travel, leadership. But here, everything I care about strengthens each other. That's what surprised me most."

In an age of automation and rapid change, the ability to hold multiple identities, strengths, and ambitions at once has never mattered more. Employers today increasingly seek graduates who pair technical knowledge with communication, empathy, collaboration, and judgment. In fact, national hiring surveys show that the vast majority of managers now view these human-centered skills as just as important as professional expertise. It's exactly this blend of capability and character that distinguishes Marist students as they enter a workplace defined by complexity.

Marist Trustee Ross Mauri '80, who has spent decades leading global teams at IBM, has seen firsthand how technical expertise and human judgment must coexist.

Center for Career Services Brings Students Face-to-Face with Alumni Professionals

What happens when students meet alumni who've turned their Marist experience into creative careers at one of the world's biggest media companies? Inspiration and a glimpse of what's possible.

In October, 30 Marist students traded their Hudson Valley classrooms for Paramount's headquarters in Times Square, where they found themselves surrounded by Red Fox alumni working behind some of the most recognizable names in entertainment: MTV, CBS, Nickelodeon, and Paramount Pictures. Their stories of risk, persistence, and connection carried the same message: a Marist education builds both skill and character, and the relationships formed here can change the trajectory of a career and life.

The trip was part of *Road to the Workplace*, a signature program from Marist's Center for Career Services that brings students face-to-face with alumni professionals across industries. Since 2017, the series has led more than 40 visits to companies nationwide, giving students a front-row seat to what life after Marist can look like.

At Paramount, the group met with Katie Altuz '12, Director of Multi-Platform Content Strategy, who helped organize the day. A panel of fellow alumni—spanning from Donna Tine '94 to Colin D'Amelio '15 and Annie Farragher '19—shared stories of how internships, mentorship, and persistence shaped their careers. "It's all about connections," D'Amelio told the students. "The people you meet at Marist can open doors long after graduation."

That spirit of mentorship drives *Road to the Workplace*, which connects students with alumni across industries—from entertainment and finance to tech and healthcare—turning career exploration into a sense of belonging and possibility.

For Angelina Ruiz '27, that sense of belonging was unmistakable. "Hearing how Marist alumni stay connected and lift each other up really hit home," said the digital media major. "It made me feel like I'm already part of something bigger."

NEW MARIST-SENTRICUS PARTNERSHIP EXPANDS CYBERSECURITY OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDENTS



Marist and Nuvance Health Expand Partnership to Grow the Future Healthcare Workforce


Marist University and Nuvance Health, now joining Northwell Health, are deepening their academic alliance to address critical healthcare workforce needs across the Hudson Valley and tri-state region. The partnership includes new clinical training opportunities for Marist students and the launch of an Emerging Leaders certificate program taught by Marist faculty to cultivate rising leaders within Nuvance Health.

"For nearly a decade, our collaboration with Nuvance has created powerful, real-world learning experiences for students in physician assistant, physical therapy, and medical laboratory science programs," said Dr. Alicia Slater, Dean of Science and Senior Associate Provost for Academic Operations. "This expanded partnership builds on that foundation while adding new

dimensions in leadership and data science."

The Emerging Leaders Program—a 15-week professional course led by faculty in Marist's School of Management—equips early-career Nuvance employees with essential skills in communication, financial stewardship, and team leadership. Beyond clinical placements, both organizations are also exploring opportunities for computer science and data analytics students to work with healthcare information systems, linking classroom learning with critical industry needs.

Together, Marist and Nuvance Health are preparing the next generation of healthcare professionals and leaders—strengthening the region's capacity to meet growing demand for skilled, compassionate care.

The University's School of Computer Science and Mathematics has launched a partnership with national cybersecurity firm Sentricus, creating new opportunities for student research, mentorship, and experiential learning. The collaboration includes a student-produced podcast on emerging cyber threats and a capstone project on AI and risk management—advancing Marist's leadership in cybersecurity education.

Building on the school's growing national reputation for innovation, the partnership exemplifies how Marist blends academic rigor with real-world application. Through research, hands-on projects, and industry engagement, students are gaining the skills and experience to lead in the next wave of technological progress.

FULBRIGHT HONOR HIGHLIGHTS MARIST'S DISTINGUISHED FACULTY

Dr. Duy Nguyen, Associate Professor in Marist's School of Computer Science and Mathematics, was awarded a highly competitive Fulbright U.S. Scholar Grant for Summer 2026. During a 42-day residency at Vietnam's International University in Ho Chi Minh City, he will teach a course on "Recent Advances in Variational Inference" and engage in collaborative research in mathematical statistics.

Hudson Valley Artificial Intelligence Summit

Marist took center stage in shaping the region's technological future as it co-hosted the 2025 Hudson Valley Artificial Intelligence Summit in partnership with Dutchess County Government. The event drew industry leaders, public officials, researchers, and students to campus to examine the transformative power of AI—and the human responsibility that comes with it.

Designed as a vital forum for understanding both the opportunities and ethical challenges posed by AI, the summit featured thought leaders from major tech firms—including IBM, Amazon, Central Hudson, and Nuvance Health—alongside members of **Marist + AI**, a University-wide collaborative focused on shaping Marist's institutional approach to artificial

intelligence. Together, participants shared perspectives on integrating AI responsibly into organizational strategies and everyday practice.

Kevin Cafaro '08, Principal Product Manager at Amazon, was among the panelists. Since graduating from Marist, he has built a distinguished career at the intersection of creativity and technology, where he now leads innovative applications of AI within the company's product development teams. "I think of generative AI as a supercharged intern whose job is to help you research, translate things, and operate at a scale you wouldn't otherwise reach," he said. "Its job is to study patterns and use that information to make predictions."

Its new purpose embodies the qualities Brother Seán championed throughout his life including welcome, reflection, care for community, and a deep commitment to Marist's mission.

By naming the house in Brother Seán's honor, the Marist community celebrates a legacy of leadership and service while giving new life to a historic structure that will play an active role in campus life.

Brother Seán, who served on the Board of Trustees and held leadership roles internationally within the Marist Brothers, is remembered for his intellect, compassion, and unfailing belief in the transformative power of education. Sammon House stands as a living tribute to those values.

GARTLAND COMMONS TRACK & TURF FIELD

A New Era Powered by Philanthropy

Marist Track at Gartland Commons has only been open for a few months, but it has already transformed daily life at Marist. From sunrise runs to late-evening practices, the complex hums with energy—serving Division I teams, club athletes, casual joggers, and students who simply want a beautiful place to move and reset.

For many, it has quickly become a favorite spot on campus.

“I love running before my early morning classes, and since I live in the north end it’s so nice to have the track right there,” said Lindsey Mascia ’26. “It’s super pretty during the morning, and I get to be outside before I start my busy day.”

A Long Awaited Home

For Marist's Division I track and field and cross-country programs, the new facility fulfills a long-held dream: a true on-campus home.

"The track at Gartland Commons is a dream come true for our program," said Pete Colaizzo '86, Director of Men's and Women's Cross Country and Track and Field. "Now, we have an on-campus home and a place where student-athletes in all our event groups can share in our daily pursuit to be better. In addition, this will be a boost for our recruiting efforts, as future Foxes can see first-hand what we have to offer."

The complex also serves lacrosse, soccer, and other DI programs, as well as intramural and club teams, broadening its reach across the campus community.

Powered by Generosity

The opening of the facility is the direct result of a groundswell of philanthropy and leadership.

Fundraising for the track and turf began in 2023 with a lead matching challenge from Marist Trustee Tim Tenney, whose gift inspired alumni, families, and friends to step forward in support. From significant leadership commitments to named spaces and commemorative bricks, the project has become a testament to the passion and loyalty of the Marist Athletics community.

The momentum continues to build, as donors recognize the impact this facility has on student-athlete experience, recruitment, wellness, and Marist's broader vision for vibrant campus life.

"This project is a reflection of what happens when alumni and friends rally around a shared goal," said Tenney. "The track and turf field will elevate the student-athlete experience for years to come—and strengthen the spirit of community that makes Marist special."

While the facility supports Marist's Division I teams, its purpose extends far beyond athletics. Students, faculty, and staff use the track for walking, jogging, intramurals, fitness, or simply to clear their minds.

"What I like about the track is that it's open to everyone," said Megan Doshi '26. "Whether you're an athlete, a casual jogger, or just walking with friends, it gives you a place to move, reset, and enjoy the campus."

Celebrating Together: Track & Field Alumni Day

To mark the opening, alumni, families, and friends of the cross country and track and field programs were invited to Track & Field Alumni Day and the Victory Lap celebration in September 2025. The event offered a first look at the facility—and a chance for Forever Foxes to take a ceremonial lap.

"We're really excited to welcome back our Marist Cross Country/Track family," Colaizzo said. "It will truly be a celebration for our loyal alumni base, as well as for family and friends of our current and past teams."

Looking Ahead: Phase Two on the Horizon

The opening of the track and turf field marks a major milestone, but the vision for Gartland Commons is far from complete. Phase Two—

of the project envisions

expanding—will further expand the complex into a premier home for Marist Athletics and student wellness. Plans include enhanced spectator areas, improved athlete support spaces, and additional infrastructure designed to elevate both training and game-day experiences. These upgrades will strengthen recruiting, create more opportunities for student engagement, and transform the north end of campus into a vibrant hub of activity.

As momentum continues, philanthropy will again play a critical role.

"Phase One shows what's possible when the Marist community comes together," said Vice President for Advancement Kirk Swenson. "Phase Two builds on that success—ensuring our student-athletes have the resources they deserve and our campus continues to thrive."

alumni back to campus



REMEMBERING JOHN O'SHEA

Marist University mourns the passing of Life Trustee John O'Shea, whose leadership, generosity, and devotion to the institution spanned more than three decades. Few individuals have shaped Marist's trajectory as profoundly as John, whose steady presence and deep belief in the University left a lasting imprint.

For more than 30 years, John served on the Board of Trustees with unwavering commitment. He was a familiar face at Marist events, a thoughtful advisor, and a trusted steward of the University's mission. His impact endures through the many scholarships, facilities, and programs he and his late wife, Nancy, supported. Their most recent legacy, the O'Shea Lecture Hall in the Dyson Center, stands as a vibrant space for learning and community. In 2018, one of the North Campus Residence Halls was named in their honor.

John and Nancy also established an endowed scholarship for Hudson Valley commuter students, reflecting their longtime dedication to expanding opportunity. As members of the Legacy Society, their philanthropy will benefit generations of Red Foxes.

Beyond campus, John was a pillar of the Hudson Valley, serving in leadership roles with Vassar Brothers Medical Center, United Way of Dutchess County, the Poughkeepsie Rotary Club, and other local organizations. Marist honored him with the President's Award in 2004.

A Fordham graduate, U.S. Navy veteran, and longtime CEO of Marshall & Sterling, John's life was defined by service—to his country, his community, and to Marist.
